MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRPERSON

These are particularly challenging times on multiple levels. In the past year, we saw long strikes by Canada Post employees and by educational assistants. We held a heated federal election in Canada and continue to experience the fallout of the presidential election in the U.S. In Alberta, we have the lowest per capita student funding in the country which is leading to ever decreasing numbers of school library staff and ever increasing class sizes. Many in our communities are struggling and we are seeing a corresponding shift in several funders to focus on poverty-relieving initiatives.

It's difficult to remain hopeful, but it's important to continue to show up, to try new things, and to do what we can with what we have. At YABS, one of the new things we tried in response to new challenges was to move our long-running annual Story Avenue program into schools rather than have it at Edmonton's Centre for Education. We've also been exploring more programming to meet youth in non-school settings and continue to seek new ways to engage with schools and libraries to meet our mission.

Let me share some personal highlights of volunteering with YABS this past fiscal year:

- Jurying for the Martyn Godfrey Award and hosting the online author sessions for the winners. So many good questions from these young writers! So much enthusiasm!
- Being a casino volunteer at Grand Villa Casino in Edmonton during Game 3 of the 2024 Stanley Cup playoffs. This casino is attached to the Rogers Place arena. Even though the Oilers lost that night, the fans were in good spirits!
- Meeting more of our artists in person for two YABS confabs. It's great to spend time with our literary artists and to see other board members face-to-face!
- Seeing our Tale Quest program in-person. The youth are so clever and creative as they collaboratively play a roleplaying game and then work with a literary artist to develop their ideas.

NEW PROGRAM: TALE QUEST

In 2020, we received one-time funding from the provincial government to run a virtual event for Alberta Culture Days. In partnership with Pe Metawe Games, an Indigenous-owned table top game shop in Edmonton, we came up with Tale Quest: an afternoon of collaborative storytelling games and writing workshops for youth.

In early 2025, we were fortunate to receive funding from the Edmonton Arts Council to revisit Tale Quest and run 12 sessions throughout the year in-person at Pe Metawe's storefront on Alberta Avenue. A professional game facilitator runs an age-appropriate role playing game for groups of up to 6 youth, followed by a writing workshop with a YABS artist.



FLY: FUN LIT IN YEG!

Fun Lit in YEG! (FLY!) was a series of artist visits for children and youth presented in partnership with community organizations in the City of Edmonton.

We sent artists to the Alberta Avenue and McCauley Community Leagues, multiple Boys & Girls Clubs, Scouts troops, Camp Dragonfly, The Centre for Family Literacy, The Mujeres Omega Foundation, and out-of-school programs at different Edmonton schools.

MARTYN GODFREY AWARD

The Martyn Godfrey Young Writers Award had another record breaking year in 2024! We received nearly 300 short stories from grade 4-9 students all over the province. Our volunteer jury of educators, librarians, and authors read them all and selected the three best stories in each grade.



Our 18 winners each received a certificate, a parcel of books by YABS authors, and an invitation to our exclusive Winners Circle online writing workshops for themselves plus a friend or sibling.



The elementary winners attended a workshop by Natasha Deen while the junior high winners had a session by Anna Priemaza. Our thanks go out to staff at the winners' schools who presented the certificates to the winners at school events!

This competition was a ton of fun! Thank you for the privilege of jurying this year. It was a fantastic experience, getting a glimpse into the minds of young writers!



TALEBLAZERS YEAR ROUND & BURSARIES

Taleblazers, our annual literary festival, sends authors, illustrators, and storytellers into schools and libraries all over the province. In 2024-25, we saw a return to primarily in-person visits, but continued with subsidizing travel the entire school year, not just during our traditional festival period of October/November. The structure of the Festival will continue to adapt to the needs of our hosting partners in future years.

We were fortunate to have an abundance of travel money from our casino fundraiser, but continued to face challenges. Schools remained enthusiastic about the idea of artist visits, but struggled to find room in the budget and in their prep time for extras. Schools continued to experience high rates of early retirement, downsizing, support staff strike action, and medical leave leaving them understaffed, often on very short notice.

The Taleblazers festival creates opportunities for literary artists to engage students of all grade levels around the province, which leads to enhanced levels of literacy, and most importantly, excitement about reading and the arts.



TALEBLAZERS YEAR ROUND & BURSARIES

Despite these challenges, we did our best to match up our host schools with artists who fit their needs. Under the combined banners of Taleblazers, Year-Round Bookings, Allard Win-a-Literary Artist, and Seeds of Stories bursaries, we successfully facilitated 53 bookings by 12 different artists. Our artists conducted 171 individual sessions at schools and libraries in 39 different communities across Alberta to an estimated audience of 12,000 children and youth.





We marked 25 years of offering help to hosts in paying artist fees through the Allard Win-A-Literary Artist program, prioritizing schools in particular need of extra support. We have been fortunate to offer additional bursaries through the Seeds of Stories program which is funded through private donations and small foundation grants.

The number of bursaries we're able to offer is in constant flux as we seek funding year-round to continue helping as many schools as possible.

When students have the chance to interact directly with professional authors, the experience is authentic, immediate, and deeply inspiring. They see writing not just as something confined to the walls of a classroom, but as a vibrant, real-world skill. For many of our students, meeting someone who makes a living telling stories opens up new possibilities for how they see themselves, their creativity, and their futures. These visits light a spark that can change how students approach not only literacy but their own sense of voice and agency.

By making these workshops free and accessible, YABS ensures that students from all backgrounds can benefit from the same high-quality programming, thereby promoting equity across our education system.

STORY AVENUE



Each February, the Young Alberta Book Society works with five Edmonton schools and nine literary artists to run Story Avenue, a series of writing workshops for hundreds of inner city Grade 5 and 6 students. We faced three new challenges in 2025:

- Student numbers had exploded as compared to the previous year. In the past, the program has accommodated around 400 students each year. In 2025, we were looking at over 550.
- Our fundraising had not been as successful as hoped. Several long-time funders did not renew and applications to new funders did not bear fruit.
- The Education Assistants and Administrative Assistants at Edmonton schools went on strike from early January to mid-March.

With an overloaded conference centre, an underfunded budget, and inadequate available school staff to maintain student-staff ratios for a field trip, it was clear the model had to pivot.

Thanks to the Werklund Foundation and our casino fundraising, we still had sufficient funds to carry on with a modified event. So, on February 20 and 21, eight of the artists instead visited the schools – Delton, Norwood, John A. MacDougall, Mee-Yah-Noh and Wîhkwêntôwin – giving workshops to over 550 students directly in their classrooms, sometimes with two classes combined. Marty Chan delivered his sessions online so several classes could login to each of his workshops, allowing for more students to participate than would have been possible at the Centre for Education.


